AWR Shares Gospel in the Shadows

“I have to show these things to my father, even if he and the community kill me.” The young woman who spoke these words is from a country in which converts to Christianity are often persecuted and even killed. Adventist World Radio broadcasts are attracting people to the gospel no matter what the consequences.

Can you imagine what it must be like to live in a country that has little or no religious freedom . . . a country in which accepting Jesus could mean persecution and even death? These are exactly the circumstances that new converts face in some parts of the world as they accept new life in Christ.

These are the places to which missionaries cannot go, or places in which the Gospel, if it is shared at all, is done quietly—in the shadows. As I travel, I find that in so many places this is the norm, NOT the exception. Yet it is in these very places that AWR is experiencing wonderful success. The following true-life account we received from one of our producers may bring tears to your eyes. We cannot share the names of this father and daughter or where they live,

but this miraculous and moving story illustrates how the Holy Spirit and AWR are working as a great team:

“A man was turning his radio dial and discovered the AWR program and began to listen to it secretly. After a time he quietly approached an Adventist pastor for more information. Unknown to him, his daughter also discovered AWR and not only listened to the radio but secretly joined an Adventist youth Bible study group.

“Because of the serious danger, neither of them knew that the other had been faithfully listening to AWR or studying the Bible. Finally the daughter said to the pastor of the youth group, ‘I have to show these things to my father, even if he and the community kill me.’ She brought home a set of DVD Bible studies and other literature. Imagine the surprise—and relief—when the daughter discovered that her father was also a secret believer, and when the father discovered that his daughter had already committed her life to Jesus. They now are faithfully making discreet contacts to others in their country and telling as many people as they dare to listen to the AWR broadcast.”

What You Need to Know Before Looking for Health Information Online

A recent study conducted by the National Institutes of Health (NIH) indicates a growing number of Americans are seeking general health information from the Internet as a first source, rather than consulting their doctors. Here are the top five things to consider when evaluating health information online:

1. Always consider the source of information. Good sources include government sites; university or medical school sites; not-for-profit groups whose focus is research and teaching; and organizations dedicated to providing health-care services and sharing knowledge from their own medical experts, such as Mayo-Clinic.com.



2. Avoid sites that are mainly sponsoring a product or service or that want you to take action right away, such as buying something or disclosing personal information.

3. Make sure the site you're turning to has the latest information.

4. Information should be presented in a clear and concise manner, and should be factual and verifiable.

5. Make sure the site states clearly who the intended audience is. Many professional sites have one section for consumers, another for medical professionals.
