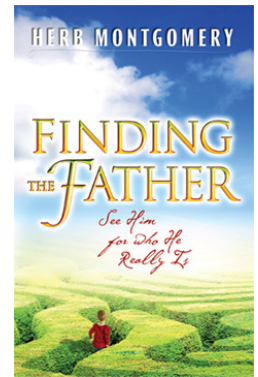
Title: **Finding the Father**
