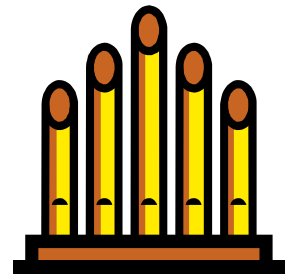

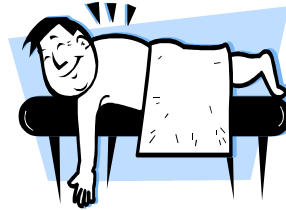
Bowlers Wanted!

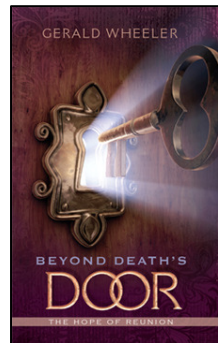

Although the Bible has much to say on the subject of death, there are several conflicting views of the afterlife. Which one is actually biblical? And which view does science support?

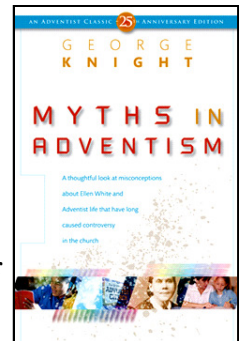
Beyond Death's Door searches the Bible for answers on this topic—and discovers that one of the first lies told humanity has been taught as gospel truth for thousands of years.

Questions That Need Answers

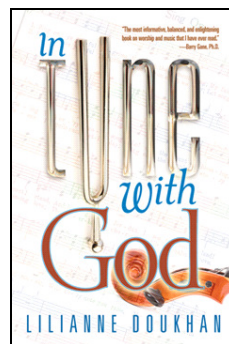
