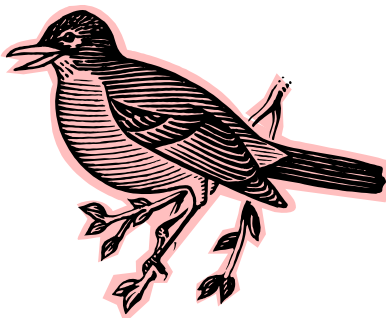

Tackle Digital Housecleaning This Spring

The warmer months are always a great time to do a little spring cleaning, but don't ignore the digital gadgets and gizmos you have lying around the house. 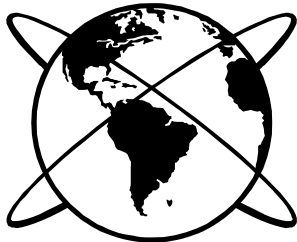

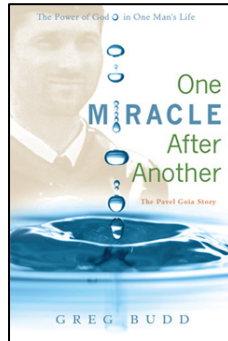

Title: **One Miracle After Another**

Author Bio: Greg Budd grew up as a modern-day prodigal, and his life was spared time and again as the result of intercessory prayer. His passion is to share God's prevailing power when His people pray.

Pavel Goia knew when he was 5 years old that God had called him to speak for Him. Yet by the time Pavel reached his teens, having a good time with friends was far more important to him than his family's religion. And Communist Romania wasn't exactly friendly to Christians.

But God got his attention one fateful night, and his life took that proverbial U-turn. Pavel made a covenant with God, and his dedication to that covenant was tested almost immediately. Author Bio: Reinder Bruinsma is a longtime pastor and church administrator. He hails from the Netherlands and earned a Ph.D. in church history from the University of London. He and his wife, Aaffe, who translates books, have two grown children.

With a clear, straightforward definition such as this, the subject of the church isn't one that most people would consider a "doctrine." For this reason, there aren't many books that deal with this crucial fundamental belief. This very readable and informative treatment of such a vital topic fills an important gap in Adventist literature.

Reinder Bruinsma's far-ranging look at the doctrine of the church moves from Old and New Testament foundations for this doctrine up through church government and on to controversial issues such as ordination and church discipline.

Fittingly, he concludes with the mission and future of the church. His fourfold approach—biblical and theological, historical, practical, and with an Adventist perspective—ensures that every facet of the doctrine is explored in detail.

This thought-provoking discussion challenges those who call themselves "God's people" to examine their current understanding of the church and to prayerfully consider their roles as part of the body of Christ.
